About the PAFR

The Popular Annual Financial Report of Monroe County is presented as a means of increasing public understanding and confidence in County government and its elected officials through easier, more user-friendly financial reporting. As you review our PAFR, we invite you to share any questions, concerns or recommendations you may have.

We are pleased to present the Monroe County Popular Annual Financial Report (PAFR) for the fiscal year that ended December 31, 2023. Monroe County's fiscal year runs from January 1 to December 31. This report deals with the fiscal year that ran from January 1, 2023 to December 31, 2023, and is known as FY2023.

The purpose of this Popular Annual Financial Report is to summarize and simplify information contained in the Annual Financial Report of Monroe County, which is due six months after the close of the fiscal year. The County's financial statements are prepared in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) in the United States of America and are independently audited by Mauldin & Jenkins, CPA. The Annual Financial Report is available for review online at www.monroecoga.org. Much of the information in the Annual Financial Report is technical and complex. As a result, the full financial statements may not be particularly useful to the citizens of Monroe County who wish to better understand County finances. The (PAFR) is not obligated to be audited under GAAP rules, however it does comply.

Inside this year's PAFR, you will find general information about your County and your County government, highlights from different government departments showing how some of your money was spent this fiscal year, how well your County government did this year, and finally, some accounting definitions to help you understand the charts and graphs located throughout this report.

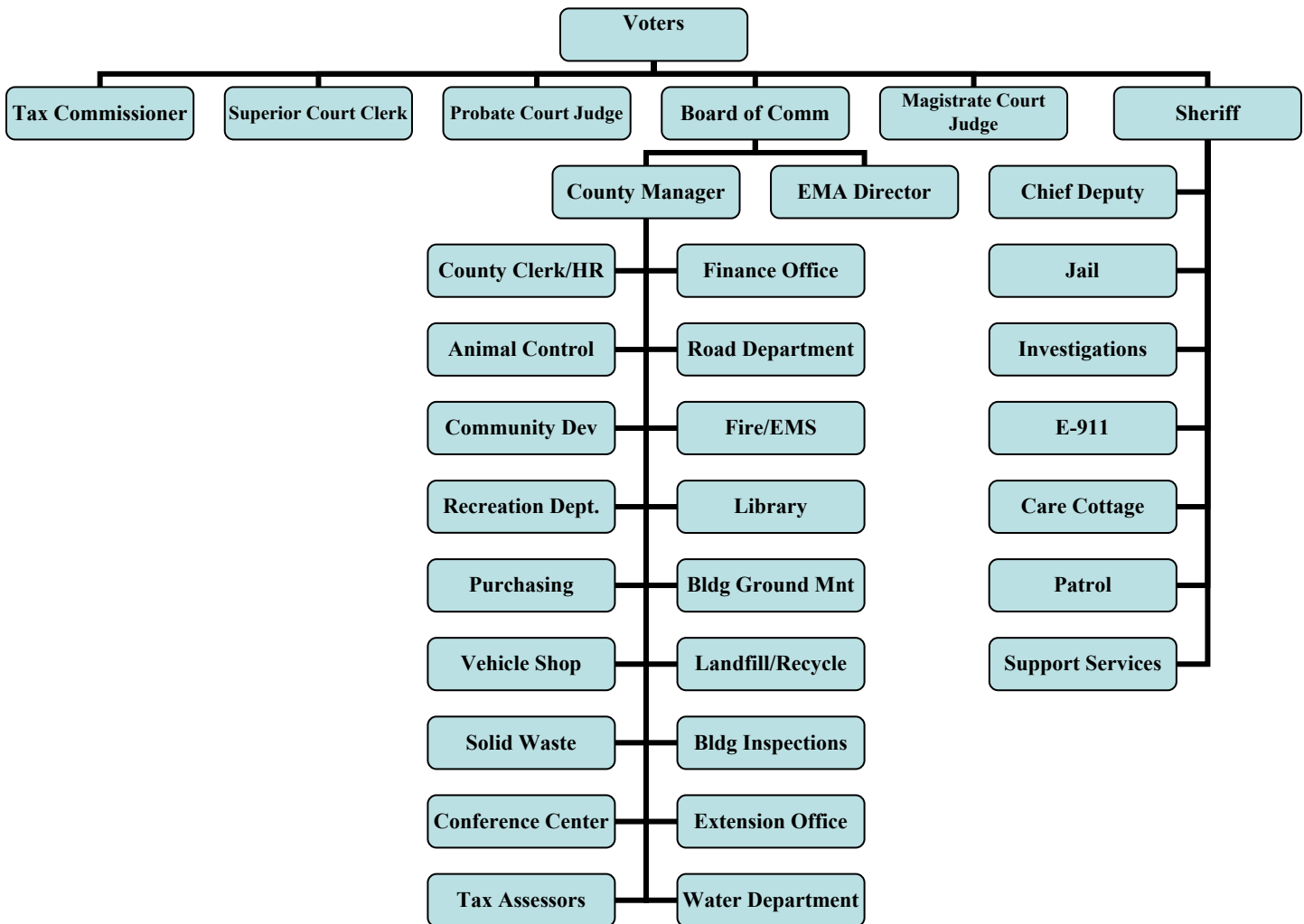

ORGANIZATIONAL CHART



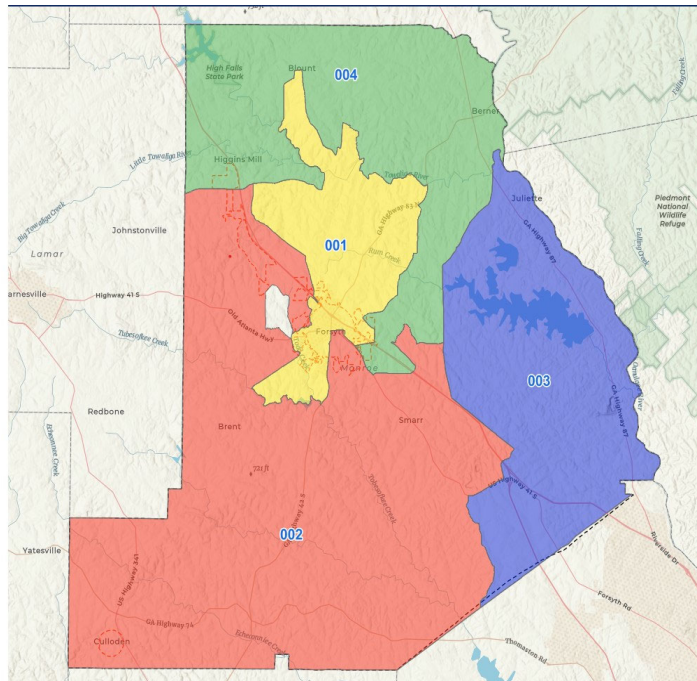
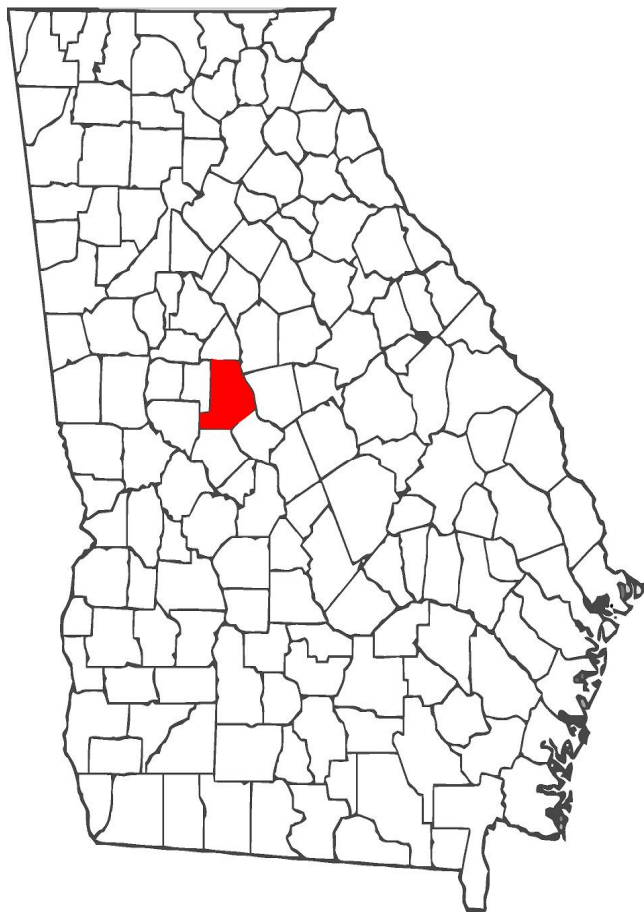
The board of commissioners of the county is the chief executive entity of the county, and it shall be the duty of the board to set the overall executive policies and procedures of the county. The county manager shall be the chief administrative officer of the county and shall be responsible to the board for the proper and efficient administration of all the affairs of the county except as otherwise provided by law.

The governing authority of Monroe County is a board of commissioners consisting of 4 members elected by district and a chairman elected at-large. The commissioners serve on a part-time basis and are elected to staggered terms of four years.

Located in north central Georgia, Monroe County is strategically located within 20 to 55 minutes of Macon & Atlanta. Monroe County is close to thrilling attractions on the pathway to and from the coastal regions, rich in history and beauty. The picturesque countryside of Monroe County features rich farmland, timber-related agribusiness, premier recreation areas, and friendly hometowns graced by historic architecture. Of the six counties that make up Central Georgia, Monroe stands as the gateway to Middle Georgia and a step back into a simpler time.

History: Monroe County is home to the second oldest founded female college in the world, which was established in 1849 as the Monroe's Counties Female Collegiate Institute. It was renamed Monroe College in 1857 and became Bessie Tift College in 1907 in honor of an alumna. The name was finally shortened to Tift College in 1956. Today, it is the site of Georgia Department of Corrections.

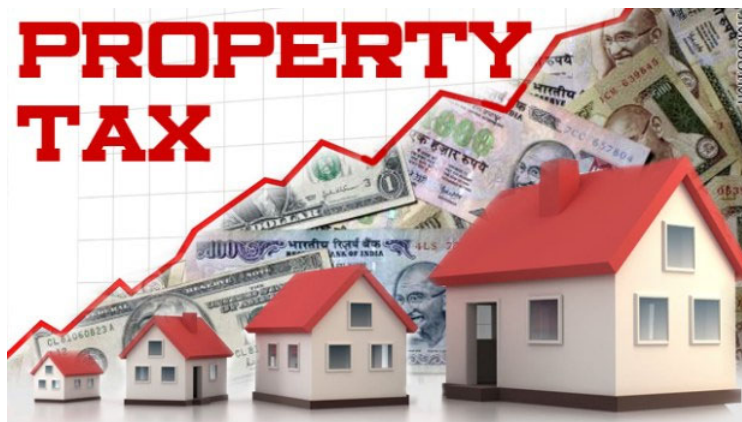
Total of 246 work orders (GIS parcel map changes) for the past year and 1,191 sales & property transfers entered into WinGAP, our in-house software program.

Our office measured, valued and inputted 247 new homes, as well as 18 manufactured homes.

We also measured, valued and inputted approximately 250 accessories (decks, porches, outbuildings, pools, etc.).

We revalued every existing home (11,063) in Monroe County in order to have at least a 39% sales ratio (Public Utilities pay at a 40% assessment value if our county ratio is between 38% & 42%).

In addition, we mailed 16,564 real property assessment notices and approximately 700 personal property notices.

Monroe County Clerk of the Superior Court serves as Clerk of Court for Superior and Juvenile Courts, as Jury Clerk for Superior Court and as Appeal Administrator supervising the Board of Equalization, member training and hearings.

Collected Over \$2.4 million and disbursed according to law over 50 entities.

Filed and recorded over 8,000 real estate records for Monroe County.

Filed and processed over 522 civil cases, 1142 criminal cases and 134 juvenile cases and attended court for hearings in these cases.

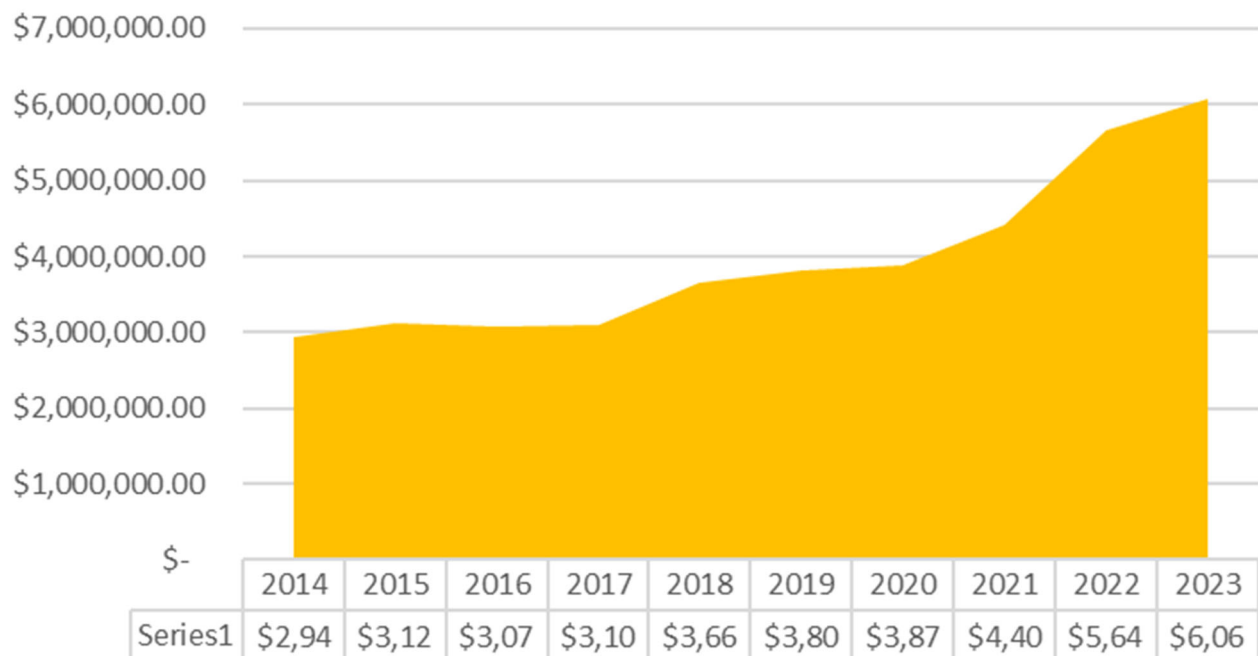

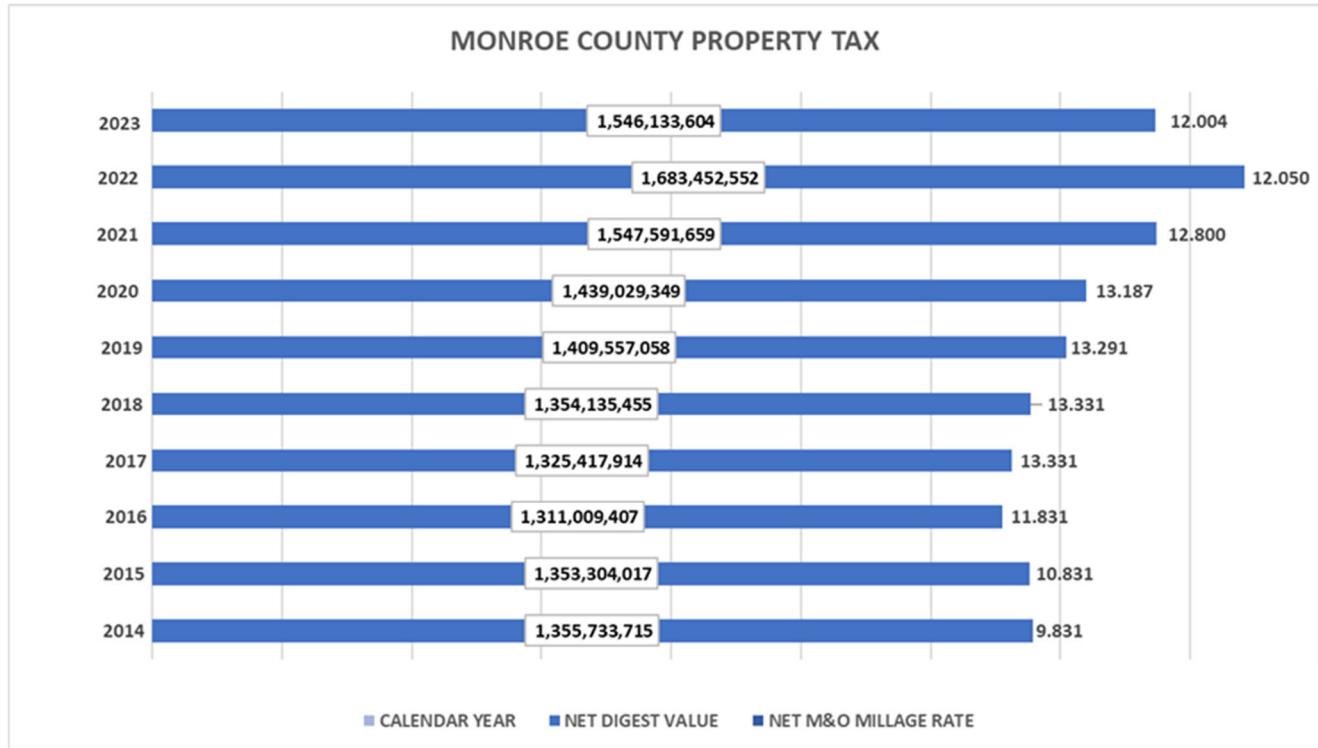

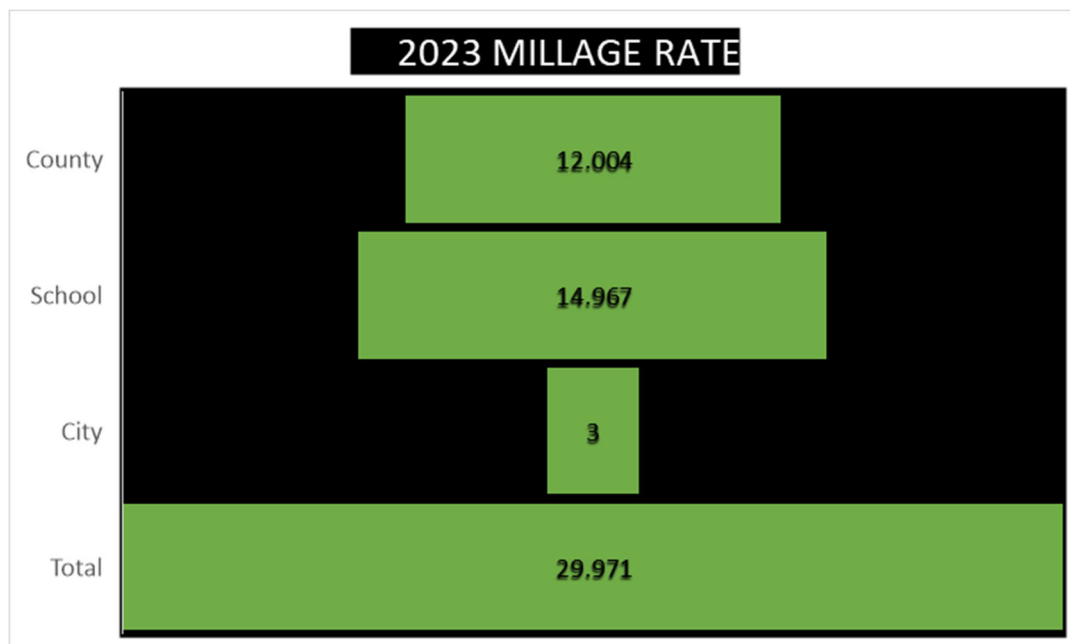

PROPERTY TAXES/MILLAGE RATE

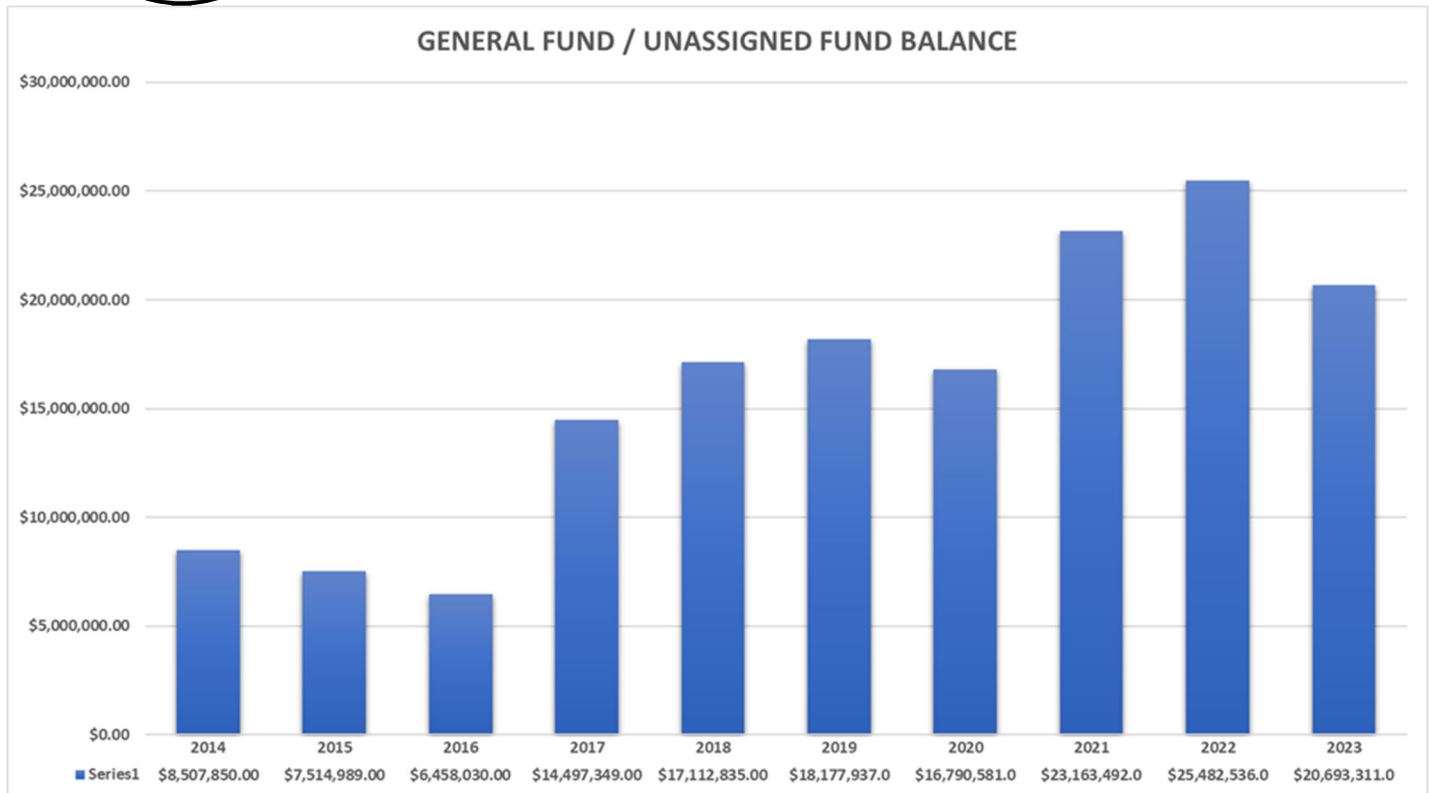

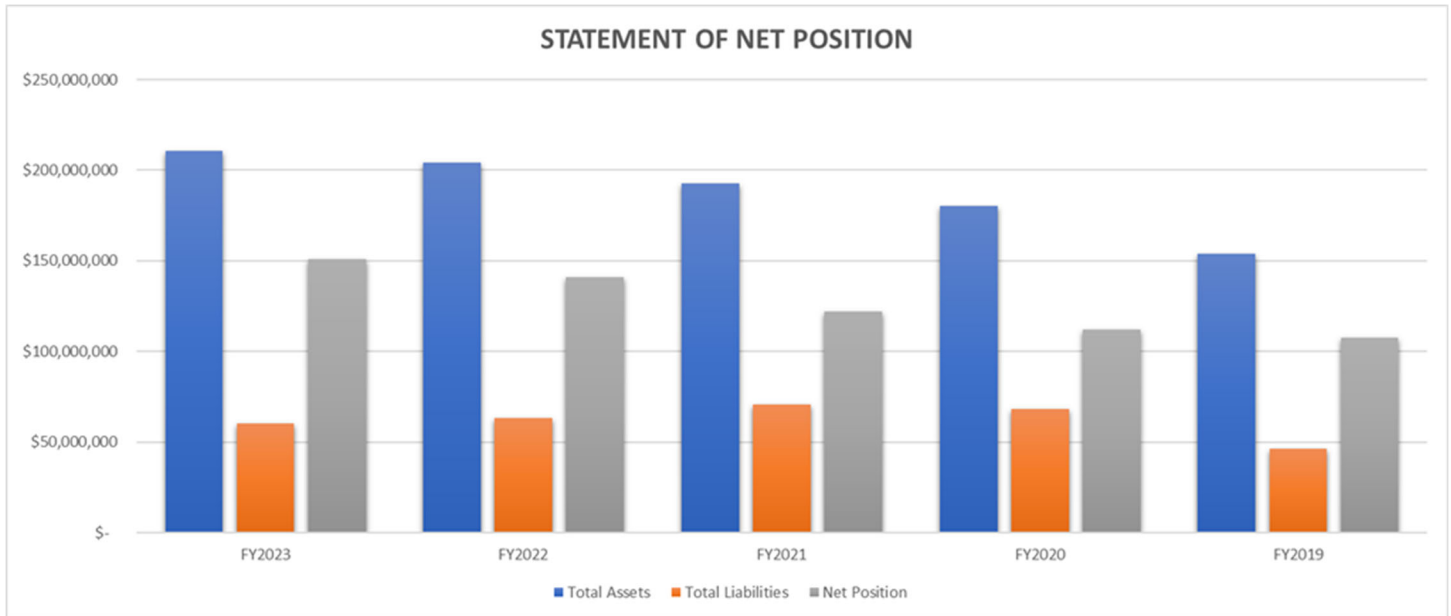
Generally, fund balance represents the difference between the assets and liabilities under the current financial resources measurement focus of accounting. Governmental funds report fund balance classifications that comprise a hierarchy based primarily on the extent to which the County is bound to honor constraints on the specific purpose for which amounts can be spent. Fund balance is classified as nonspendable, restricted, committed, assigned, or unassigned.

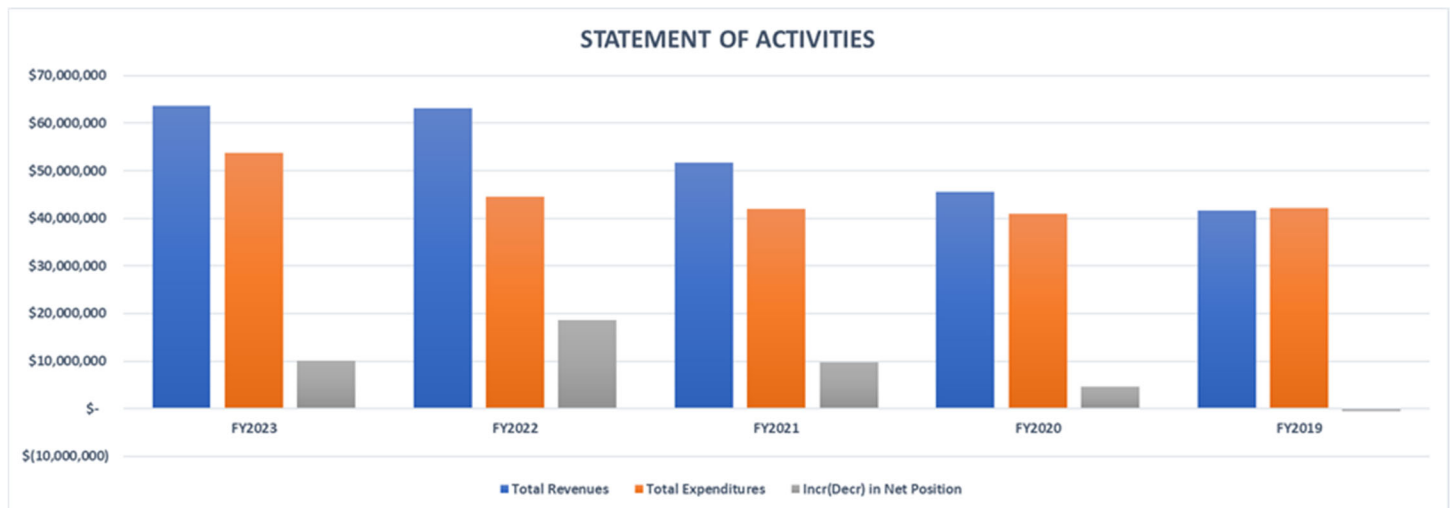

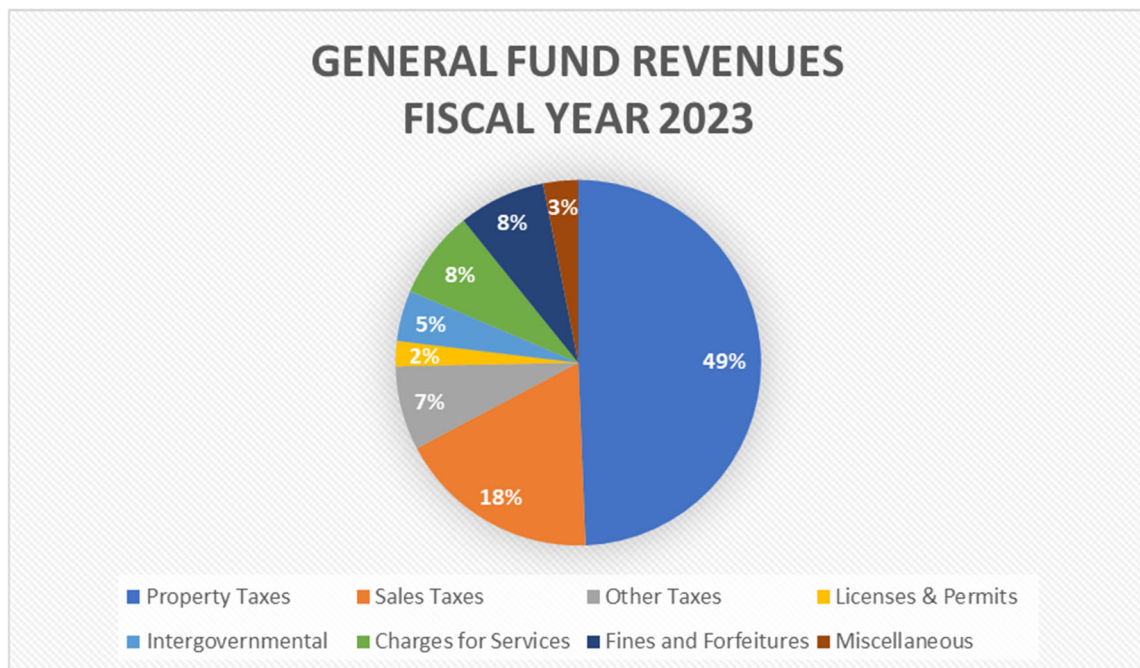
GENERAL FUND REVENUES

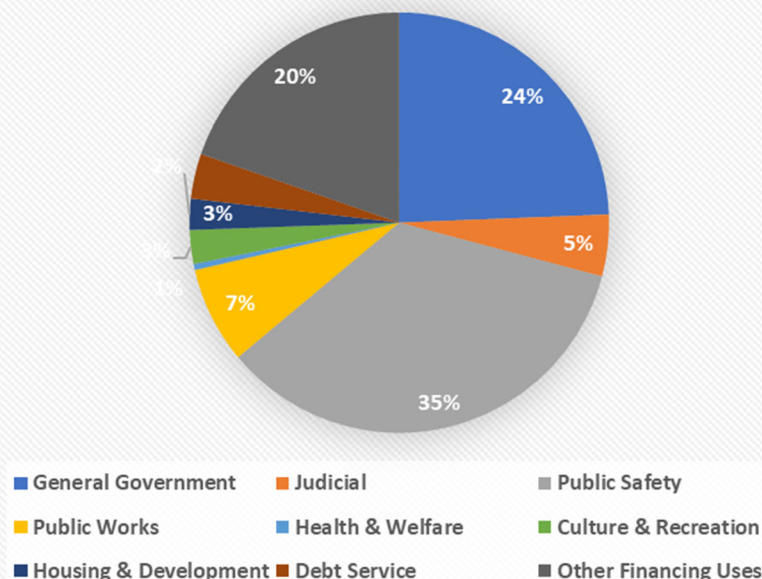
How our County Government Revenues are spent?

Glossary of Terms

Appropriations: An authorization granted by the Board of Commissioners to spend revenue for purposes specified in the appropriation act.

Assets: Items of ownership. Assets can include cash, stock, land, buildings, machinery, furniture, and other equipment.

Bonds: A certificate of debt issued by the County government guaranteeing payment of the original investment plus interest by a specified future date.

Budget: A plan of financial operation using an estimate of proposed expenditures for a given period of time (a fiscal year) and an estimate of proposed revenue to finance the expenditures.

Capital Assets: Assets of a long-term character (beyond the current year) that are intended to continue to be held or used, such as land, buildings, vehicles, machinery, furniture, and other equipment.

Deferred Outflow of Resources: A consumption of net assets by the government that is applicable to a future reporting period. An example of a deferred outflow of resources is a grant paid in advance of meeting the timing requirement.

Deferred Inflow of Resources: An acquisition of net assets by the government that is applicable to a future reporting period. An example of a deferred inflow of resources are taxes received in advance of the period for which they are levied.

Expenditures: Government purchases which can be financed by revenue and/or government borrowing, i.e. bonds, tax anticipation notes, etc.

Fund Balance: The portion of fund revenue over expenditures available for use. Fund balance is classified as follows

- **Nonspendable** – Fund balances are reported as nonspendable when amounts cannot be spent because they are either (a) not in a spendable form or (b) legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.
- **Restricted** – Fund balances are reported restricted when there are limitations imposed on their use either through the enabling legislation adopted by the County or through external restrictions imposed by creditors, grantors or laws or regulations of other governments.

- **Committed** – Fund balances are reported as committed when they can be used only for specific purposes pursuant to constraints imposed by formal action of the County Commission through the adoption of a resolution. Only the County Commission may modify or rescind the commitment.

- **Assigned** – Fund balances are reported as assigned when the amounts are constrained by the County's intent to be used for specific purposes, but are neither restricted nor committed.

- **Unassigned** – Fund balances are reported as unassigned when the balances do not meet any of the above criterion. The County reports positive unassigned fund balance only in the General Fund. Negative unassigned fund balances may be reported in all funds.

General Fund: A fund used to account for the ordinary operations of the County government that are financed from taxes and other general revenue.

Liabilities: Future spending of revenue as a result of past transactions and other past events. Liabilities are reported on a balance sheet and are divided into two categories:

- **Current Liabilities:** These liabilities are reasonably expected to be liquidated within a year. They usually include payables such as wages, taxes, accounts payable, unearned revenue, portions of long-term bonds to be paid this year, short-term obligations, and others.

- **Long-term Liabilities:** These liabilities are reasonably expected not to be liquidated within a year. They usually include long-term bonds, notes payable, long-term leases, pension obligations, and long-term product warranties. In these liabilities, the County has to pay after a fixed period of time.

Net Position: The difference between (a) assets and deferred outflows of resources and (b) liabilities and deferred inflows of resources.

Revenue: Financial resources other than from interfund transfers and debt issue proceeds. Monroe County receives Revenue through property taxes, sales and other taxes, licenses and permits, grants, fines and forfeitures, charges for services, investment income, and miscellaneous sources.
